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# Emergency Child Care for Health Care & Other Frontline Workers - SCHOOL AGE CHILDREN ONLY

On Monday, January 3rd, 2022, the Premier of Ontario announced that, in an effort to slow the spread of the COVID-19 virus and the Omicron variant, all schools in the province will revert to remote learning beginning January 5<sup>th</sup> until at least January 17, subject to public health trends and operational considerations.

To support health care and frontline workers, the Ministry of Education has implemented a **targeted emergency child care program for school-aged children only (ages 4 -12 years)**, at no cost to eligible parents, until schools reopen for inperson instruction, or until emergency child care is terminated by the Ministry of Education.

Emergency Child Care (ECC) will be available starting January 10<sup>th</sup>.

ECC is currently available at various locations across the County of Lambton. However, spaces are very limited and will be prioritized for medical and emergency services personnel. Families are encouraged to make alternate child care arrangements but may contact the Children's Services office to complete the ECC application below. If a child care space is not available for your request, the name of each eligible child will be kept on a waitlist.

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# Requirements and Criteria for Targeted Emergency Child Care for School-Aged Children

### **Eligibility**

Those eligible for emergency child care (ECC) include health care and other frontline workers whose school aged children are enrolled in school (list below).

The following summarizes the steps to apply for emergency child care for your school aged child(ren):

- Step 1: Complete a simplified application for emergency child care by emailing childcareadmin@county-lambton.on.ca or by calling the County of Lambton Children's Services Department at: 519-344-2062 extension 2201;
- **Step 2**: A Children's Services Department staff will follow up with you within 2 business days to confirm eligibility;
- **Step 3**: Once you have received e-mail confirmation that you are approved for emergency childcare, contact one of the approved providers listed above to secure a child care space. You must share your Children's Services Department approval email to the child care provider as proof of eligibility.



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#### LIST OF ELIGIBLE WORKERS FOR EMERGENCY CHILD CARE

(#1 - #13 will be prioritized)

#### Individuals Eligible for Emergency Child Care

- 1. 1 An individual who is,
  - i. a regulated health professional, or
  - ii.an unregulated health care provider working in health care delivery, eitherdirectly or indirectly.
- 2. A police officer as defined in the Police Services Act.
- 3. A special constable appointed pursuant to section 53 of the *Police Services Act*.
- 4. A member of a police force other than a police officer as defined in the *Police Services Act*.
- 5. An individual employed as a firefighter as defined in the Fire Protection and Prevention Act, 1997.
- 6. An individual who is,
  - i. engaged in providing fire protection services as defined in the Fire Protection and Prevention Act, 1997,
  - ii.employed in a fire department as defined in the Fire Protection and Prevention Act, 1997, or
  - iii. employed in the Office of the Fire Marshal.
- 7. A paramedic as defined in the *Ambulance Act*.
- 8. An individual who works in a child care centre or who otherwise provides child care in accordance with the requirements in this Order.
- 9. Staff as defined in the Retirement Homes Act, 2010.
- 10. Licensees as defined in the Retirement Homes Act, 2010 who are individuals and who work or provide services at a retirement home.
- 11. Staff as defined in the Long-Term Care Homes Act, 2007.
- 12. A First Nations Constable appointed pursuant to section 54 of the *Police ServicesAct* or a member of a police service in which policing is delivered by First NationsConstables.
- 13. Members, officers and special constables appointed under the *Royal CanadianMounted Police Act* who are working in Ontario.
- 14. An individual who works for a manufacturer or distributor of pharmaceutical products or medical supplies, including medications, medical isotopes, vaccines, antivirals, medical devices, sanitizers and disinfectants.
- 15. An individual who performs work in relation to the administration, manufacturing or distribution of COVID-19 vaccines and whose work cannot be performed remotely.
- 16. An individual who works in a pharmacy as defined in the *Drug and Pharmacies Regulation Act*.
- 17. An individual who works in an establishment where goods or services are sold or offered for sale to the public, if a pharmacy as defined in the *Drug and Pharmacies*



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Regulation Act is located within the establishment.

- 18. A provincial offences officer as defined in the *Provincial Offences Act*.
- 19. An individual employed by the Ministry of the Attorney General or a municipalityin Ontario who is required to work on site to support the administration of the Ontario Court of Justice, the Superior Court of Justice or the Court of Appeal for Ontario, including,
  - court services representatives, court and client representatives, court clerks, court registrars, court reporters, enforcement officers and any other administrative officers and employees that are considered necessary for theadministration of the courts,
  - ii. business professionals and Crown prosecutors of the Criminal Law Division, and
  - iii. employees of the Victim/Witness Assistance Program.
- 20. An individual who provides essential justice-related frontline services to Indigenous persons involved in the justice system and who is employed by an Indigenous community or Indigenous organization through a program funded bythe Ministry of the Attorney General or the Ministry of the Solicitor General, including,
  - iv. the Indigenous Courtwork Program,
  - v. the Indigenous Bail Verification and Supervision Program, or
  - vi. the Indigenous Bail Beds Program.
- 21. An individual who is engaged in the delivery of frontline victim services funded bythe Ministry of the Attorney General under the Ontario Victim Services program.
- 22. A coroner as defined in the Coroners Act.
- 23. A worker in a correctional institution as defined in the *Ministry of Correctional Services Act* or an independent contractor who supplies services to correctionalinstitutions, including, but not limited to, employees of Trilcor.
- 24. Probation and parole officers as described in the *Ministry of Correctional Services Act*, institutional liaison officers, court liaison officers, individuals employed as assistant area managers and area managers of staff at probationand parole offices and the administrative and support staff at these offices.
- 25. An individual employed in the Institutional Services Division of the Ministry of the Solicitor General, including a person employed in a correctional institution as defined in section 1 of the *Ministry of Correctional Services Act*.
- 26. An individual employed in the Operational Support Division of the Correctional Services Recruitment and Training Centre in the Ministry of the Solicitor Generalwho,
  - vii. provides facilities or maintenance services, or
  - viii. is a Senior Staff Development Officer or Manager of Customized Training.
- 27. An employee of Compass Group Canada Ltd. who works at or provides services in relation to the Cook Chill Food Production Centre.
- 28. An individual employed in the Ministry of the Solicitor General who performs oneor



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more of the following functions for the Institutional Services Division or Community Services Division:

- ix. Performing electronic monitoring services.
- x. Performing CPIC searches.
- xi. Preparing community supervision orders.
- 29. An individual employed in the Ministry of the Solicitor General at the Centre for Forensic Sciences who is involved in supporting and conducting forensic testingand analysis.
- 30. An individual employed in the Ministry of the Solicitor General at the Provincial Forensic Pathology Unit.
- 31. An individual employed in the Provincial Emergency Operations Centre or at the Ministry of the Solicitor General's Emergency Operations Centre.
- 32. An animal welfare inspector appointed pursuant to the Provincial Animal Welfare Services Act, 2019 or an individual employed by the Ministry of the Solicitor General in the Animal Welfare Services Branch who is directly involved in supporting animal welfare inspectors.
- 33. An individual employed in the operation of,
  - xii. a place of secure custody designated under section 24.1 of the Young Offenders Act (Canada), whether in accordance with section 88 of the YouthCriminal Justice Act (Canada) or otherwise, or
  - xiii. a place of secure temporary detention as defined in subsection 2 (1) ofthe Child, Youth and Family Services Act, 2017.
- 34. Persons, other than foster parents, who deliver or directly support the delivery of residential care, treatment and supervision to children and young persons residing in residential settings licensed under the Child, Youth and Family Services Act, 2017.
- 35. An individual employed by a children's aid society designated under section 34 of the Child. Youth and Family Services Act. 2017 to provide services necessary for the performance of a children's aid society's functions, as set out in subsection 35 (1) of that Act.
- 36. An individual employed by a service agency as defined in section 1 of the Services and Supports to Promote the Social Inclusion of Persons with Developmental Disabilities Act, 2008, to provide services and supports, within the meaning of section 4 of that Act, to adults with developmental disabilities.
- 37. An individual who is engaged in the delivery of services funded by the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services under the Violence Against Women Support Services or the Anti-Human Trafficking Community Supports programs.
- 38. A staff member of a transfer payment recipient funded by the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services who is engaged or employed to deliver interpreting or intervenor services for persons who are deaf, deafened, hard of hearing or deafblind.
- 39. Persons employed in the Direct Operated Facilities Branch of the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services.
- 40. An individual who performs work that is essential to the delivery of core servicesin a



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municipality or First Nation community, as determined by the municipality or First Nation.

- 41. An individual who performs work of a critical nature in their service area or community, as determined by the Minister of Education or his delegate in consultation with the relevant service system manager or First Nation as thoseterms are defined under the *Child Care and Early Years Act, 2014*.
- 42. An individual appointed as an inspector under subsection 28 (1) of the *Child Careand Early Years Act*, 2014.
- 43. Any individual whose child was registered in an emergency child care program delivered by a consolidated municipal service manager or district social service administration board during the time period beginning on April 6, 2021 and endingon April 16, 2021.
- 44. A staff member of a school as defined in the *Education Act* who provides, or supports the provision of, in-person instruction at a school to pupils with specialeducation needs who cannot be accommodated through remote learning.
- 45. A staff member of a school as defined in the *Education Act* who,
  - xiv. provides or supports the provision of in-person teaching or instruction in a school that is permitted to provide in-person teaching and instruction under this Order, and
- xv. has a child who is enrolled at a school that is not permitted to provide in- person teaching or instruction under this Order and who is not receiving in-person teaching or instruction.
- 46. A member of the Canadian Armed Forces or an employee of the Department of National Defence.
- 47. All persons employed in the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry who areengaged in,
  - xvi. prevention, mitigation, preparedness, response or recovery actions, as applicable, with respect to,
    - A. fires as defined in the Forest Fires Prevention Act.
    - B. floods.
    - C. dam failures, or
    - D. emergencies relating to oil and gas exploration or production, hydrocarbon underground storage, and salt solution mining, or
  - xvii. the provision of support services to Conservation Officers through the operation of the Ministry's Provincial Communications Unit.
- 48. A person who holds a licence issued under section 13 of the *Private Security and Investigative Services Act*, 2005 to act as a security guard.
- 49. An individual who is an inspector appointed under the *Food Safety and QualityAct, 2001* or a field-person or officer appointed under the *Milk Act*.
- 50. An individual employed in the Ministry of Labour, Training and Skills Development in Radiation Protection Services.
- 51. An individual who is employed by any of the following entities to carry out work that is deemed by the entity to be critical to the ongoing generation, transmission, distribution and



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storage of electricity, or the ongoing refining, transmission, distribution and storage of gas or other type of hydrocarbon, sufficient to meet the demands of the province of Ontario:

xviii. The Independent Electricity System Operator.

xix. A generator, transmitter or distributor within the meaning of the *Electricity Act*, 1998. xx. A gas distributor or gas transmitter within the meaning of the *Ontario EnergyBoard Act*, 1998.

xxi. A distributor as defined in subsection 40 (3) of the *Technical Standards andSafety Act,* 2000 that is not already described in subparagraph ii or iii.

xxii. An oil refinery.

- 52. An individual who performs work that is essential to the operation of, or who conducts COVID-19 sampling and analysis related to,
  - xxiii. a municipal drinking water system as defined in section 2 of the *Safe Drinking Water Act*, 2002,
  - xxiv. a non-municipal year-round residential system as defined in section 1 of Ontario Regulation 170/03 (Drinking Water Systems) made under the *SafeDrinking Water Act*, 2002, or
  - xxv. a wastewater treatment facility or a wastewater collection facility as those terms are defined in section 1 of Ontario Regulation 129/04 (Licensing of Sewage Works Operators) made under the *Ontario Water Resources Act* andto which that Regulation applies.
- 53. An individual employed in the Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks who performs work in relation to the following and whose work cannot be performed remotely:

xxvi. Laboratory services.

xxvii. Environmental monitoring and reporting. xxviii. Responding to environmental incidents.

xxix. The operation of Ontario Parks.

- 54. An individual employed in a business involved in the collecting, transporting, storing, processing, disposing or recycling of any type of waste.
- 55. An employee of a hotel or motel that is acting as an isolation centre, health carecentre, vaccine clinic or that is housing essential workers.
- 56. An individual working in a homeless shelter or providing services to homelesspersons.
- 57. An individual who works for a business that processes, manufactures ordistributes food or beverages.
- 58. An individual who works in a supermarket, grocery store, convenience store, farmer's market or other store that primarily sells food, other than an establishment described in section 3 of Schedule 7.
- 59. An individual who works at a business that produces food, beverages, oragricultural products including plants, including by farming, harvesting, aquaculture, hunting or





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fishing.

- 60. An individual who works at a business that supports the food or agricultural products supply chains.
- 61. An individual who is engaged in work that involves driving a Class A or D motorvehicle as described in Ontario Regulation 340/94 (Drivers' Licences) made under the *Highway Traffic Act*.
- 62. An individual employed by a municipal transit agency, Metrolinx or the OntarioNorthland Transportation Commission whose work cannot be performed remotely.
- 63. An individual who works for a business described in section 40 of Schedule 7.
- 64. Officers as defined in the *Customs Act* (Canada) who are working in Ontario.
- 65. Employees of the Canada Post Corporation who are working in Ontario
